Hames Valley

Hames- the creek, hamlet, post office, and valley were named for John Hames, who had extensive holdings in the area. John Hames was born in Osage County, New York, in 1811, son of Benjamin Hames. John and his brother, Benjamin, Jr., arrived in California in the early 1840's. John was considered the founder of Soquel. He and his brother also built a flouring mill at Corralitos. In 1883 he went into the sheep business on his ranch in Hames Valley. Hames married Drusilla Shadden in 1846 at Monterey. Laura Frudden Rist states the Hames family came to Hames Valley from Soguel in 1866. He built a fine home where the valley joins the Salinas River. The Porter Sesnon family purchased Mr. Hames Land in the late 1800s: it comprised of 12,000 acres and ranch buildings. He died at the home of his brother at Peach Tree in December 1894 at the age of 84.



Letters written by Elsie Alphie Wilkinsen (wife of Ory Sayler) While Floyd was attending Cal Poly in San Luis Obispo

Lockwood, Sept. 30, 1909

Dear Floyd,

I will fulfill my promise of a few days ago by writing with Ory. Everything is all O.K. at home and all goes well without the boss. We had three cards from Charley from Stockton but have heard nothing since. I suppose he is doing Ashland by now. Maud and family are all well and inquire of you often. While Daisy was here we all went over to your grandpa's and spent Sunday. Had a very pleasant time. Maud and Chas went too so we were quite a crowd. Barbara seems to think Ory can't do anything right now without her help so she spends most of each day following him around. I have him cleaning house washing windows and getting things in shape, for fear your papa might bring someone home with him and I'll be all prepared. Aunt Maggie didn't go to Ashland after all, but I haven't heard the reason. "I suppose they all feel terrible to be there without her." The pictures taken in San Jose of yourself, Florence & Chas. And Father came. Some of them are very good for Kodak pictures. Ory and I were counting up how long till Thanksgiving, and my! It seems a long time to wait for you to come home. Mr. Pierce has been shelling almonds. There seems guite a few of them. Daisy says she feels ashamed she hasn't written but Clifton has been on his bad every since she went home and she can't find time to write to you. So I will write as often as I can until your papa and Chas comes home so you will know how we are behaving ourselves. Well I will close for now with love to you from Barbara and myself. E.A.W.
