Jolon

Jolon is an unincorporated community in Monterey County, California. It is located 17 miles south of King City, at an elevation of 971 feet. Jolon is located in the San Antonio River valley, west of Salinas Valley. It is in a rural area, about 6 miles from Mission San Antonio de Padua, and is part of Fort Hunter Liggett.

The first European land exploration of Alta California, the Spanish Portolà expedition, camped on the San Antonio River near today's Jolon on September 24, 1769, having crossed the Santa Lucia Range from the coast. The party continued north through Jolon Valley (today's Jolon Road, county route G14).


The town was founded by Antonio Ramirez who built an inn at the place in 1850. The Jolon post office was founded in 1872. Jolon was owned by <u>William Randolph Hearst</u> in the 1920s, who sold it to the US Army, its current owner. Jolon is mentioned in the chorus of the song "South Coast", as a place you could gamble back in its frontier days.

Jolon is also the setting for <u>John Steinbeck</u>'s novel <u>To a God Unknown</u>. The town is not mentioned in the book but is the basis for the fictional town in the book.

His parents were Broder "Bodie" and Ethel Reiwerts who farmed. Bud had one sister Joann. He attended Bradly Elementary School, where his mother taught. He graduated from King City High School and Cal Poly in San Luis Obispo. He served in the Army after attending Cal Poly. He came to Bakersfield to work for Standard Oil Company and met Sheila Nolan, they married in 1962. They just celebrated their 58th wedding anniversary. Bud and Sheila have two children Debbie and Bryan, and 4 grandchildren. Bud works for an Ag product company, and lives in Gilroy. Bud was a director from the beginning in 2002 until he retired as director in 2012. He again became director in 2019.
