New Board / Director DAVID JAMES SAVOY

David James Savoy's saga began April 30,1955 in San Luis Obispo's Mt View Hospital and then home to Templeton. He spent his school years in Atascadero and graduated from Atascadero High. Industrious, early on, he always had a job, a lemonade stand, lawn mowing. gas station attendant, his bike got quite a workout! After he got his first car he branched out to McDonald's in San Luis Obispo. His next jobs are too many to list. After traveling he decided to work for the state of California and took courses at Questa to be better qualified, it served him well. He became Dr. Savoy and worked for the state for 38 years and is now retired.

As you probably know, David is very social, he loves people! He is happiest when surrounded by a group to talk with, he's interested. People are his hobby! But of all his many acquaintances and achievements his daughter Danielle is his ultimate triumph, his pride and joy just ask him!

Rating highest among his favorite places is the Salinan Homeland, the local area encompassing the San Antonio and Nacimiento Rivers and the Santa Lucias west to the coast. It was populated by his Salinan Indian ancestors long before the first Europeans discovered it. It is literally in his blood.

Mission San Antonio marriage records document the first marriage of a non-Indian to an Indian neofita, namely Juan Maria Ruiz and Margarita de Cortona. These are David's grandparents 10 generations back to 1773, two years after the founding of Mission San Antonio de Padua in 1771.

Within the above 10 generations is Lewis Wilson McCormack and his Miwok Indian wife Catarina Forbes and their four children. Encouraged by his wife's stepbrother James Alonzo Forbes, they arrived at San Antonio Township about 1875 to homestead. Their son Frank Bias McCormack is David's great-great-grandfather. He was a well-known hunter as related in the local histories, "Salt of The Earth" and "The Ancestors Speak". He supplied the Smithsonian Museum of Natural History with five of its first California Condors for exhibits.

Yes, David is deeply rooted emotionally and in lineage to the Homeland, the beautiful Valley of the San Antonio.

Lea Magee is also one of our newer Directors. He graduated from Monterey High School. After graduation Lea worked on several cattle ranches, driving cattle by horseback in California and Nevada for several years. He studied mechanics at Chico State. After years of being a self-employed mechanic, he went to work for Land Rover North America as an offroad driving instructor for over 24 years. He retired in 2017. He's been a Lockwood resident for over 7 years and has a strong passion for saving and preserving the various farming implements and machinery located at the Nacitone Museum.
